Socio-Economic Survey 2022



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i. Methodology

The study used the Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) method and quota sampling based on the most recent official population data available in each of the targeted cities to achieve the desired sample size. The target population is residents aged between 16 years and 35 years who live in Great Tunis, Sousse and Sfax.

One to One for Research and Polling interviewed a sample of **300** persons from the target population. **150** in Great Tunis, and **75** in both Sousse and Sfax. The data collection started on **5 January**, **2022** and ended on **8 January**, **2022**.

About data collection

As described above, the data collection was done based on the CATI method. The operation took 4 days. Before starting the data collection, the sampling expert prepared the quotas for each city. The quotas were established based on the most recent official available data for each city from the National Statistics Institute (NSI). Quotas were fixed by area, age, gender and governorates.

As the highest difference between the target quotas and the achieved quotas is 1.6% there was no need to weight the data.

Details about the list of phone numbers and coverage

One to One create a frame composed of all possible existing numbers with the different existing prefixes (all possible combinations for the remaining numbers) then the system randomly selects numbers and injects each time (until reaching the targeted sample) a set of 10 000. The random generation of numbers is done for each new survey. Therefore, we don't particularly know when calling, if the number works or not, or even exists or not. Each created number is unique and all the lists come from a unique frame where there are no duplicates. The list created is composed of 100% mobile phone numbers. The injected list is split depending on the penetration of each mobile operator in the studied city. One to One has covered all the telephone operators in Tunisia (Ooredoo, Orange and Tunisie Telecom)

Interview length

The interviews average length is 18 min 45 seconds.

Details about data cleaning

In carrying out data preprocessing, we went through three main steps:

Translation of the database, coding of open-ended questions and data cleaning.

In data cleaning phase we have checked if the number of complete questionnaires matches the target by checking for missing questionnaires and removing duplicate ones. Comparing the obtained quotas to the established ones to detect differences is done on a regular basis by tracking the quality of the data and also at the end of data collection. We also checked the quality of open-ended responses, correct understanding of questions and coherence of answers.



II. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In this study, 300 respondents were interviewed about their socio-economic situation. Half of the sample was living in Great Tunis, and the remainder of the sample was equally split between Sfax and Sousse.

DEMOGRAPHICS:

In general, the respondents were divided equally into men and women whose ages are between 16 and 35 years old with a dominance of the age group 25-35 (58.7%) and most of them are single (71%). For those who are married (28%), the average number of kids is close to 2.

90% of those who have school aged children, the children already in school. 82% of the children who are attending schools are registered in a public schools.

Concerning the level of education, more than 1/3 of the sample graduated from university (42.7%). 43,7% of the respondents are continuously working, but this proportion differs depending on gender: it reaches 54% for men and only 33% for women. The low-income group dominates the sample (47.3%). No children younger than 18 are contributing in the household income.

SECURITY AND SAFETY:

83% of the sample feel either very safe or rather safe in their neighborhood and 17% feel rather unsafe or do not feel safe at all in their neighborhood, which is relatively high. Respondents with high income feel much safer than those with low income, which clearly related to the area of living, also the older the respondent is, the safer he feels.

If we want to compare the level of security situation in the neighborhood between regions, Sfax takes the first place in the safety category (48%) then Great Tunis takes the second place (42%) and finally Sousse (40%).

6% of the respondents have often experienced or witnessed street crimes and 16,7% often witnessed or experienced violence.



ECONOMY: BASIC NEEDS

The second topic, is about basic needs and the ability to get enough goods for the household. 27% of respondents declared that they manage to provide sufficient food for their household, despite the current food prices, 28% can just about manage to get enough food and 42% either hardly or cannot at all provide enough food for their household, which shows a very tough situation to the major part of the sample. It's more difficult when it comes to the ability of buying basic consumer goods such clothing or shoes, as only 16% manage to provide those goods for their household, 28% can just about manage to provide and 53% either hardly or simply cannot provide these kinds of goods for their household.

HOUSING:

Talking about housing, respondents often live in a small family¹ (76.3%), and only 4.7% of the sample live alone; also, the rate of women who live in small families is higher than the rate of men and similarly the age group 16-24.

An overwhelming majority describe their dwelling as "House" (82.3%) and minority who said that they live in apartments (17%). In addition to this, Sfax is the city in the first rank concerning the proportion of respondents who live in houses (93.3%) and Great Tunis is in the last rank (78%) as there are much more apartment building in Great Tunis.

Respondents with low incomes mentioned that they live in houses more than the other categories (84.5%). However, it has to be noted that living in a house does not imply a higher standard of living than living in an apartment, especially in popular neighborhoods.

Turning now to the status of the dwelling. Generally, they seem to be equipped with the minimum needs, and rarely respondents declared that their dwellings miss doors or windows, refrigerators and other housing equipment. The availability of electricity is relatively good, and it is mainly affected by power interruptions due to utility

outages or electrical faults; otherwise, it is always available no matter what the situation of the respondent, either with high income (90%) or low income (81%). But this is not the case for drinking water, especially for Sfax. Only 66.7% of residents of Sfax mentioned that they always have access to clean drinking water and the rest either sometimes have access or never.

However, this is not the case in Sousse or Great Tunis. The great majority of the residents of those cities often have access to clean drinking water (79.3% for Great Tunis and 72% for Sousse).

Heating is missing in some dwellings (28.7%) - especially in Sousse and Sfax because of the lack of the access to natural gas in some neighborhoods in those cities - as well as the internet (33%) also with a clear difference between the capital were 27% do not have access to internet, and Sousse and Sfax inhabitants, with respectively 37% and 40% of non-Internet access in their household. 100% of the respondents have phones – either mobiles or home phones.

With regard to the costs of housing, it has to be noted that most respondents live in owned houses (69.3%), especially those with low incomes (82%) and the majority of those who rent their dwelling, pay monthly a rent between 100 and 499 dinars (72.6%) The higher the income gets, the larger the size of the dwelling gets. It has to be noted that 30% of the respondents are not able to declare how large their dwelling is.

HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES:

More than three quarters of respondents (79.7%) have access to all necessary hygiene products. The higher the income the more they have access to hygiene products (96%). Those with a basic level of education have much less access to this kind of products (56%).

With regard to health services, many people have access to different medical services. Starting with the example of the vaccinations: 50.3% of the sample always have access to vaccination against polio, the flu... and 82% of the sample always have access to vaccination against SARS-Covid-19 since it is always available and for free. Generally, women have more access to vaccinations (60% for general vaccination and 85.3% for SARS-Covid vaccination) than men (40.7% for general vaccination and 78.7% for SARS-Covid vaccination). The dominant age group who has access to vaccinations is 25-35 - 53.4% for the general vaccination (against polio, the flu etc.) and 83% for vaccination against SARS-Covid19.



75.6% of the sample have access to general practioners (54.3% always have access and 24.3% have limited access). The percentages are quite similar for the three concerned cities.

Half of the sample (50%) declared that they always have access to dentists and the majority of them are the residents of Great Tunis (56%). The higher the income is, the higher the access to this service (64% for the High-income vs 61.6% for the Medium-income and 40.1% for the Low-income).

However, the accessibility of medical specialists is not as simple as the previous services, especially for Sfax. Around the one third of its surveyed residents (34.7%) said that they have always access to medical specialists, and this is not the same thing for Great Tunis and Sousse, which have around 44% of their surveyed residents who can always reach medical specialists.

Generally, women are able to have access to this service more than men. The majority of them have access to this service either always (44,7%) or limited access (22%). For treatment and surgery in hospitals, the minority of the respondents have access either always (29%) or limited access (13,3%). Generally, this depends on the income, and those who said that they have high income, can access hospitals more than other categories (46%).

LIFE SATISFACTION:

The survey also indicates the respondents' satisfaction with their life: 21,7% of the respondents declared being very satisfied of their life, 44% rather satisfied, 16% rather not satisfied and 18% not satisfied at all with their life. The most discriminative demographic variable with this result is the level of income.
